The environmental crisis and us - part 2: plastic

Plastic gets a bad press, sometimes quite rightly – for example, replacing single-use plastic items with sustainable alternatives usually makes sense; and removing plastic microparticles is a challenge. But plastic is a very versatile material, lightweight, strong, and easily moulded. It has become a vital component in many fields where these properties are valuable: for example, medical applications – the NHS could not function without plastic. Banning such a useful material entirely is not the best solution: the problems lie not so much with the use of plastic but with its production and, especially, its disposal.

New plastic can be produced from three sources: fossil fuels, plants, or recycled plastic. Fossil fuels are unsustainable, and we need to stop their extraction. The production of plastic should not provide fossil fuel companies with another excuse to continue operations. Bio-plastic from plants is sustainable, although it competes for growing space with food and bio-fuels, and can be recyclable (PET, as used in plastic bottles) or biodegradable/compostable (but may need industrial rather than home composting). Recycled plastic is already a significant percentage in many items: Evian (Danone) now make bottles from 100% recycled plastic for some of their products.

In an ideal world, all plastic would be recyclable and all plastic products would be made from recycled material – this is a 'circular economy'. In practice, some new plastic would still be needed to make up for losses in the recycling process. However, this is an attainable goal. We can encourage this process by choosing to buy products which include a high percentage of recycled material and are themselves recyclable.

'End of life management' is an important part of good product design yet until recently it seems to have been ignored by much of the plastics industry. Years of global mismanagement of plastic disposal have resulted in massive pollution of rivers, seas and oceans. Much of this has come from China and SE Asia, but the material itself started out in Europe and America. We exported our plastic waste to be treated elsewhere. Often the treatment facilities were inadequate and the waste material turned out to be contaminated. No wonder China banned these imports and others have followed. This was essentially fly-tipping on a global scale. Those responsible should be prosecuted.

To achieve a circular economy we must have a recycling system that is fit for purpose. The infrastructure for that can only be ensured by government – international, national, and local. We can help by applying pressure towards this outcome in the same ways as campaigning for the reduction of carbon emissions (see part 1, September issue).

Locally, Shropshire's recycling rate for all household waste (not just plastic) was 54.6% in 2019/20, although 6.8% of this was rejected due to contamination (eg non-recyclable plastic). What can we do to improve this? Essentially, recycle more of the right plastic and less of the wrong plastic. Unfortunately, this isn't always easy: there are many different types of plastic, which may require different recycling processes, and - although this is improving - recycling information is often missing from product labels. Kerbside recycling for Caynham currently accepts plastic bottles (latest advice: squash bottle and replace cap – also replace screw top caps on glass bottles), plastic trays and pots (not black), plastic tubes (hand cream etc), spray tops from cleaning products (but not pumps, eg hand wash), toothpaste pumps (but not tubes), and plastic caps from Tetrapaks etc.

However, other plastic products can be recycled locally too. Most obviously, larger supermarkets (in Ludlow, Tesco) are legally obliged to accept any plastic bags for recycling – these include magazine wrappers, bread bags (non-waxed) and bags for some garden compost etc. Free schemes for recycling more difficult products are run by Terracycle (www.terracycle.com), sponsored by manufacturers but usually accepting any make. There are collection points in Ludlow for several of these: the links below give more details of what is and what isn't accepted.

Update on calculating your carbon footprint

Most online calculators break down your emissions into four categories: household energy use; transport; food and drink; and general expenditure ("stuff"). They all do a reasonable job for the first 2 categories and a fair one for the third, but often your emissions due to purchases seem to be deduced from lifestyle assumptions which may be completely inaccurate - and this category may produce a large part of your footprint. The best calculators allow you to customise your stuff to reflect your actual behaviour more closely. The best two that I have found are:

Caring for God's Acre continues support for Caynham Churchyard.

Stephen Ashford writes: On 4th August, six 'Caring for Gods Acre' conservation volunteers, led by Alex, visited Caynham churchyard. The main task of the day was to cut and remove the long grass areas as they have mainly flowered and seeded now and we need to remove the nutrient from the grass area before it goes back down to the ground. This will improve it as a wild flower meadow habitat (making it more biodiverse) as time goes on. The grass was scythed and removed to the compost heap. The volunteers also piled up sticks to make habitat piles for wildlife and made a list of all the species that they could find to be recorded on a national database (I-record) for future reference. Caynham is a very good churchyard with a huge number of species that we don't really see elsewhere, it is basically the parish's original seedbank from before intensive farming. With the help of volunteers from the village and a management plan for the churchyard so that more areas can be improved we hope to make a big difference to the local environment.
